

SC pigtail connector connection method

- Mechanical Splicing:** Use a mechanical splice holder to align the fibers and secure them with index-matching gel or adhesive. This method is faster but may have slightly higher insertion loss than fusion splicing.

Connector Termination: The SC connector end of the pigtail is then plugged into a patch panel, optical distribution frame (ODF), or network equipment. SC connectors are compatible with standard SC ports and provide a secure, snap-in connection.

Testing: After splicing, test the connection for insertion loss and return loss to ensure optimal performance.
